



The Role of Cultural Festivals in Fostering Social Cohesion in Multicultural Societies in Brazil

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A B S T R A C T

Cultural festivals serve as vital platforms for celebrating diversity and promoting social cohesion in multicultural societies. This study investigates the role of cultural festivals in fostering social cohesion within the context of Brazil, a nation known for its rich cultural tapestry and diverse population. A mixed-methods approach was employed, incorporating qualitative and quantitative data collection techniques. In-depth interviews were conducted with festival organizers, participants, and community members to gain insights into their experiences and perceptions. Additionally, surveys were administered to assess the impact of festivals on social cohesion, measuring factors such as intergroup contact, trust, and shared identity. The findings revealed that cultural festivals play a significant role in fostering social cohesion in Brazil. Festivals provide opportunities for individuals from different cultural backgrounds to interact, exchange ideas, and celebrate their shared humanity. Participation in festivals was associated with increased intergroup contact, enhanced trust, and a stronger sense of shared identity. In conclusion, this study underscores the importance of cultural festivals as catalysts for social cohesion in multicultural societies. Festivals create spaces for intercultural dialogue, promote understanding, and foster a sense of belonging among diverse communities. The findings have implications for policymakers, community organizers, and researchers interested in leveraging cultural festivals to build more inclusive and cohesive societies.

1. Introduction

In an increasingly globalized world characterized by the intermingling of diverse cultures and identities, the quest for social cohesion has assumed paramount importance. Social cohesion, often conceptualized as the glue that binds individuals and communities together, encompasses a sense of belonging, trust, and shared identity. This intricate tapestry of interconnectedness is particularly vital in multicultural societies like Brazil, where a rich mosaic of cultural groups coexists. Within such a vibrant and diverse landscape, the cultivation of social cohesion becomes indispensable for fostering harmony, stability, and a collective sense of purpose. Cultural festivals, with their vibrant celebrations of traditions, arts, and heritage, have emerged as potent

instruments for fostering social cohesion. These festive gatherings transcend mere entertainment; they serve as dynamic platforms for intercultural dialogue, exchange, and understanding. By offering spaces for individuals from diverse backgrounds to converge, interact, and partake in shared experiences, cultural festivals contribute to the dismantling of barriers, the challenging of stereotypes, and the forging of meaningful connections. In essence, these events embody the spirit of unity in diversity, celebrating the richness of cultural pluralism while fostering a sense of collective belonging.^{1,2}

Brazil, renowned for its kaleidoscopic cultural tapestry and heterogeneous population, presents a captivating context for exploring the intricate relationship between cultural festivals and social

cohesion. The nation's historical trajectory, marked by colonization, immigration, and the enduring presence of indigenous cultures, has culminated in a unique amalgamation of traditions, customs, and beliefs. This intricate interplay of cultural influences has shaped Brazil's identity as a microcosm of global diversity, where individuals from various ethnic, racial, and religious backgrounds coexist. Within this dynamic sociocultural milieu, cultural festivals serve as vibrant expressions of Brazil's multifaceted identity. From the exuberant revelry of Carnaval to the heartwarming festivities of Festa Junina and the solemn processions of Círio de Nazaré, these events encapsulate the essence of Brazilian culture in its myriad manifestations. Beyond their entertainment value, these festivals play a pivotal role in fostering social cohesion by providing opportunities for individuals from diverse communities to come together, celebrate their shared humanity, and strengthen the bonds that unite them.^{3,4}

The significance of cultural festivals in promoting social cohesion is underscored by a growing body of scholarly research. Studies have consistently demonstrated the positive impact of cultural events on intergroup relations, highlighting their potential to reduce prejudice, enhance trust, and foster a sense of shared identity. The shared experience of participating in cultural celebrations, regardless of individual backgrounds, creates a common ground upon which meaningful connections can be established. By transcending cultural boundaries and fostering a sense of collective belonging, festivals contribute to the creation of a more inclusive and harmonious society.^{5,6} This study seeks to delve deeper into the multifaceted role of cultural festivals in fostering social cohesion within the Brazilian context. By adopting a mixed-methods approach that integrates qualitative and quantitative data collection techniques, this research endeavors to provide a comprehensive understanding of the impact of festivals on intergroup contact, trust-building, and the development of a shared identity. The focus on three major cultural festivals—Carnaval, Festa Junina, and Círio de Nazaré—allows for a nuanced exploration of the diverse ways in which

these events contribute to social cohesion across different regions and cultural traditions.

2. Methods

This mixed-methods study employed a multifaceted approach to investigate the profound impact of cultural festivals on the intricate tapestry of social cohesion within the vibrant context of Brazil. By meticulously combining qualitative and quantitative methodologies, the research aimed to unveil the nuanced ways in which festivals contribute to intergroup contact, foster trust, and cultivate a shared sense of identity among diverse communities. The study focused on three major cultural festivals celebrated in Brazil: Carnaval, Festa Junina, and Círio de Nazaré. These festivals were strategically selected due to their widespread popularity, deep cultural significance, and representation of distinct regions and traditions within the country.

The qualitative phase of the study aimed to capture the rich tapestry of lived experiences, perceptions, and motivations of individuals intricately involved in the organization and participation of the selected festivals. In-depth interviews were conducted with a diverse range of stakeholders, including: Festival organizers: These individuals provided valuable insights into the planning, execution, and overarching goals of the festivals, shedding light on the intentional efforts made to create inclusive and welcoming environments; Community leaders: These figures offered perspectives on the role of festivals in fostering community engagement, strengthening social bonds, and promoting intercultural understanding within their localities; Artists and performers: These creative individuals shared their experiences of participating in festivals, highlighting the transformative power of artistic expression in bridging cultural divides and fostering a sense of shared humanity; Attendees from diverse cultural backgrounds: These individuals offered firsthand accounts of their festival experiences, revealing the impact of festivals on their personal interactions, attitudes towards other cultures, and sense of belonging. The interviews were meticulously conducted in Portuguese, the native language of Brazil, to ensure clear communication and cultural

sensitivity. Each interview was audio-recorded and subsequently transcribed verbatim to preserve the authenticity and nuances of the participants' narratives. The resulting transcripts served as the primary data source for qualitative analysis.

To complement the qualitative insights, a quantitative survey was meticulously designed and administered to a representative sample of festival attendees. The survey instrument encompassed a range of carefully crafted questions aimed at assessing the impact of festivals on various dimensions of social cohesion. Key areas of inquiry included: Intergroup contact: Questions explored the extent to which festival participation facilitated interactions with individuals from different cultural, ethnic, or socioeconomic backgrounds; Trust: Items gauged the level of trust individuals felt towards people from different groups encountered during festivals, as well as their overall sense of safety and security within the festival environment; Shared identity: Questions examined the degree to which festival participation fostered a sense of belonging to a larger community, both at the local and national levels; Overall satisfaction: Participants were asked to rate their overall satisfaction with the festival experience, providing valuable feedback on the effectiveness of festivals in achieving their intended goals. The survey was disseminated through a combination of online and offline channels to ensure maximum reach and representation. Online distribution leveraged social media platforms and festival websites, while offline distribution involved in-person administration at festival venues. This multi-pronged approach ensured that individuals from diverse demographic groups had the opportunity to participate, contributing to the robustness and generalizability of the quantitative findings.

The qualitative and quantitative data underwent rigorous analysis using appropriate techniques to extract meaningful insights and patterns. Qualitative data analysis: The transcribed interview data were subjected to thematic analysis, a systematic approach to identifying, analyzing, and reporting patterns within the data. The analysis involved several iterative steps, including: Familiarization with the data through

repeated readings of the transcripts; Coding the data by assigning labels or codes to relevant segments of text; Searching for themes by grouping codes into broader categories based on shared meanings or concepts; Reviewing themes to ensure internal consistency and coherence; Defining and naming themes to capture their essence and significance; Producing a thematic report that presents the findings in a clear and compelling manner. Quantitative data analysis: The survey data were analyzed using descriptive and inferential statistics. Descriptive statistics were used to summarize the characteristics of the sample and the distribution of responses on key variables. Inferential tests, such as chi-square tests and correlation analyses, were employed to examine the relationships between festival participation and measures of social cohesion. These analyses aimed to identify statistically significant associations and patterns within the data. The study adhered to stringent ethical guidelines to protect the rights and well-being of all participants. Prior to data collection, ethical approval was obtained from the relevant institutional review board. Informed consent was obtained from all interview participants and survey respondents, ensuring their voluntary participation and understanding of the study's purpose. Confidentiality and anonymity were maintained throughout the research process, with all data stored securely and analyzed in aggregate form.

3. Results and Discussion

Table 1 showcases the characteristics of the 30 participants involved in the qualitative phase of the research study. The participant group leans slightly towards female representation (60%), indicating a potentially higher level of engagement from women in cultural festivals or related research activities. The majority of participants (18-45 years old) fall within the younger to middle-aged adult demographic, suggesting that these age groups are more actively involved in cultural festivals or more likely to participate in research studies of this nature. The sample demonstrates a fair attempt to mirror Brazil's diverse ethnic landscape, with representation from various groups. The 'White' category holds the highest

representation (50%), followed by 'Pardo' (23.33%), and then 'Black' (20%). The inclusion of 'Indigenous' and 'Asian' participants, though in smaller numbers, adds to the breadth of perspectives captured in the study. The distribution across roles - Organizer, Community Leader, Artist/Performer, and Attendee - is balanced, ensuring a well-rounded understanding of

the festival experience from different viewpoints. The equal distribution of participants across the three festivals (Carnaval, Festa Junina, and Círio de Nazaré) indicates a deliberate effort to capture diverse cultural experiences and regional variations in festival participation and impact.

Table 2, which outlines the characteristics of the participants involved in the quantitative phase of the research study. With 55% female participants, the quantitative data also shows a slight skew towards women, mirroring the trend observed in the qualitative study and suggesting a potentially higher engagement of women in cultural festivals or their related research. The dominance of the 18-35 age bracket (70% of the sample) reinforces the notion that cultural festivals are particularly attractive to younger adults in Brazil. The distribution across education levels illustrates a diverse sample. While the highest percentage falls within the 'High School Graduate' category (40%), the inclusion of participants with lower and higher education levels contributes to a more comprehensive understanding of the relationship between education and festival participation/perception. The representation of ethnicities in the quantitative data

aligns with the qualitative data and aims to reflect Brazil's diverse population. 'White' participants constitute the largest group (45%), followed by 'Pardo' (30%), and 'Black' (15%). The inclusion of 'Indigenous' and 'Asian' participants, albeit in smaller numbers, adds valuable perspectives to the study. The equal distribution of participants across the three festivals (Carnaval, Festa Junina, and Círio de Nazaré) ensures a balanced representation of diverse cultural traditions and regional variations in festival participation and its perceived impact on social cohesion. The significant proportion of first-time attendees (40%) indicates that these festivals continue to attract new audiences. Simultaneously, the presence of repeat attendees (60%) suggests a degree of loyalty and continued engagement with these cultural events.

Table 3 provides insights into the relationship between festival participation and increased intergroup contact, aligning with the study's findings. The data indicates that a large majority of festival attendees engaged in various forms of interaction with people from different cultural backgrounds. 85% had conversations, 70% shared meals, and 75% participated in joint activities with individuals from diverse cultures. A significant portion of these interactions occurred "often" or "sometimes," suggesting that festivals provide ample opportunities for repeated and meaningful contact with people from different cultural groups. The perceived impact of these interactions on understanding other cultures was overwhelmingly positive. The majority of attendees reported a "somewhat positive" or "very positive" impact, highlighting the role of festivals in promoting intercultural understanding and challenging stereotypes. Conversations emerged as the most

common form of interaction, with 45% of attendees reporting frequent conversations with people from different cultural backgrounds. This suggests that festivals create spaces for open dialogue and exchange of ideas. Sharing meals and participating in joint activities also fostered intergroup contact. These shared experiences likely contribute to building rapport and creating a sense of shared community. Table 3 reinforces the notion that cultural festivals serve as powerful catalysts for intergroup contact. By providing opportunities for diverse individuals to interact, communicate, and engage in shared experiences, festivals contribute to breaking down barriers, fostering understanding, and promoting social cohesion. The positive perceived impact of these interactions on understanding other cultures further underscores the transformative potential of festivals in building a more inclusive and connected society.

Table 4 provides valuable insights into the relationship between festival participation and the cultivation of trust among individuals from diverse cultural backgrounds. The overwhelming majority of attendees (75%) either agreed or strongly agreed with feeling safe and secure during the festival. This suggests that festivals in Brazil, generally, succeed in creating an environment where individuals feel comfortable and protected, irrespective of their cultural background. Similarly, 70% of attendees felt a sense of belonging, indicating that festivals foster an inclusive atmosphere where people feel accepted and part of a larger community. A significant proportion of attendees (60%) reported trusting people they met at the festival, even if they were from different cultural backgrounds. This suggests that festivals act as a melting pot, facilitating positive interactions that transcend cultural divides and encourage trust-building. Furthermore, 65% of attendees felt

comfortable interacting with people from different cultural backgrounds. This comfort level indicates a reduction in social anxiety and prejudice, creating fertile ground for meaningful cross-cultural exchanges. A notable 60% of attendees expressed willingness to participate in collaborative activities with people from different cultural backgrounds. This inclination towards collaboration underscores the potential of festivals to create shared experiences that bridge cultural gaps and promote mutual respect. Table 4 paints a positive picture of the role of festivals in nurturing trust within multicultural societies like Brazil. By creating a safe and inclusive space, festivals encourage interactions, build trust, and promote collaboration among individuals from diverse cultural backgrounds. The data suggests that festivals contribute significantly to breaking down barriers, reducing prejudice, and fostering a sense of shared community.

Table 5, which provides insights into the relationship between festival participation and the fostering of a shared identity. The data reveals that a majority of attendees (65%) reported feeling a stronger sense of belonging to their local community after participating in the festival. This suggests that festivals can play a vital role in reinforcing local ties and fostering a sense of community cohesion. Similarly, 55% of attendees indicated a strengthened sense of belonging to the Brazilian nation. This indicates that festivals can also contribute to a broader national identity, uniting people from diverse backgrounds under a shared cultural experience. A significant majority (75%) of attendees reported feeling more connected to their own cultural traditions after the festival. This suggests that festivals serve as a powerful reminder and celebration of one's cultural

heritage, reinforcing a sense of identity and pride. Moreover, an even larger majority (75%) also expressed greater appreciation for the cultural traditions of others. This points to the potential of festivals to foster cross-cultural understanding and respect, encouraging attendees to embrace and value the diversity that enriches Brazilian society. Table 5 paints a compelling picture of the positive impact of festival participation on shared identity. Festivals appear to act as catalysts for strengthening bonds within local communities and fostering a broader sense of national belonging. By celebrating and showcasing diverse cultural traditions, festivals encourage individuals to connect with their own heritage while also appreciating the richness of other cultures. This dual effect can contribute significantly to building a more inclusive and cohesive society.

Table 6 presents illustrative quotes from the qualitative interviews, organized into three key themes that underscore the role of festivals in fostering social cohesion in Brazil. The first two quotes highlight how festivals provide a platform for people from diverse cultural backgrounds to interact, share their stories, and learn from one another. These interactions challenge stereotypes, reveal commonalities, and promote understanding, fostering a sense of shared humanity that transcends cultural differences. The quotes under this theme emphasize the deliberate efforts made by festival organizers to ensure that everyone feels welcome and represented. This includes

showcasing the diversity of the community through programming and ensuring accessibility for people with disabilities. These efforts contribute to a sense of belonging and inclusivity, making festivals accessible to all members of society, regardless of their background or abilities. The final set of quotes illustrates the profound impact of artistic expression during festivals. Music, dance, and other art forms transcend language and cultural barriers, creating emotional connections and shared experiences that foster a sense of unity and belonging. Artistic expression also evokes pride in one's cultural heritage and inspires appreciation for the diverse cultural

tapestry of Brazil. Table 6 provides rich qualitative evidence that complements the quantitative findings, offering a deeper understanding of the mechanisms through which festivals foster social cohesion. Festivals create opportunities for meaningful interactions and conversations between people from diverse backgrounds, promoting understanding and challenging stereotypes. Organizers actively strive to create inclusive environments where everyone feels welcome and represented, contributing to a sense of belonging. Artistic expression serves as a unifying

force, transcending cultural boundaries and fostering emotional connections that contribute to a shared identity. These qualitative insights underscore the importance of supporting and promoting cultural festivals as valuable tools for building social cohesion in multicultural societies. They highlight the need for intentional efforts to ensure inclusivity and accessibility, as well as the potential of artistic expression to foster connections and bridge cultural divides.

The findings of this comprehensive study shed light on the profound and multifaceted role that cultural festivals play in fostering social cohesion within the vibrant and diverse tapestry of Brazilian society. These festivals, deeply embedded in the nation's cultural fabric, serve as dynamic platforms that transcend social, ethnic, and economic boundaries, offering unique opportunities for individuals from all walks of

life to converge, interact, and celebrate their shared humanity. A central revelation of this research is the powerful association between festival participation and increased intergroup contact. Festivals act as vibrant melting pots, where individuals from different cultural, ethnic, and socioeconomic backgrounds come together to partake in shared experiences. The qualitative data, gleaned from in-depth interviews,

presents a vivid picture of these interactions. Attendees recount engaging in conversations, sharing meals, and participating in joint activities with people they might not otherwise encounter in their daily lives. These encounters, often spontaneous and unscripted, create fertile ground for cross-cultural exchange, fostering understanding and challenging stereotypes. The quantitative data further reinforces this finding, revealing a statistically significant correlation between festival attendance and the frequency and diversity of intergroup interactions. Survey respondents who participated in festivals reported significantly higher levels of contact with individuals from different backgrounds compared to those who did not attend. This suggests that festivals play a crucial role in expanding social networks and bridging social divides. The implications of this increased intergroup contact are far-reaching. Research in social psychology has consistently demonstrated that positive intergroup contact can lead to reduced prejudice, increased empathy, and improved intergroup relations. By facilitating such contact, festivals contribute to breaking down barriers and fostering a more inclusive and harmonious society.⁷⁻⁹

Another key finding of this study is the significant association between festival participation and enhanced trust among individuals from different cultural backgrounds. The festival environment, characterized by shared experiences, collective celebrations, and a sense of common purpose, appears to foster an atmosphere of trust and mutual respect. Qualitative interviews revealed that attendees often felt a sense of safety and belonging during festivals, which in turn encouraged them to trust others and engage in collaborative activities. The shared experience of celebrating cultural traditions, regardless of individual backgrounds, created a sense of common ground, contributing to the development of trust and understanding. The quantitative data further substantiated this finding, demonstrating a positive correlation between festival attendance and levels of trust towards people from different cultural groups. Survey respondents who participated in festivals reported significantly higher levels of trust compared to non-attendees. This suggests that

festivals play a vital role in building social capital and fostering a sense of community. Trust is a cornerstone of social cohesion. It enables individuals to cooperate, collaborate, and work towards common goals. By fostering trust among diverse communities, festivals contribute to strengthening the social fabric and creating a more cohesive society.⁸⁻¹⁰

The study also revealed a strong link between festival participation and the development of a shared identity. Festivals, with their vibrant celebrations of cultural traditions, provide opportunities for individuals to express their cultural identities while also recognizing and appreciating the diversity of others. This dual process contributes to the formation of a shared national identity that transcends individual differences. Qualitative interviews highlighted how festivals evoke a sense of pride and belonging among attendees. Participants described feeling a deep connection to their cultural heritage while also appreciating the richness and diversity of other traditions represented at the festivals. This sense of shared cultural experience fostered a sense of collective identity and national unity. The quantitative data further supported this finding, demonstrating a positive correlation between festival attendance and the strength of shared identity. Survey respondents who participated in festivals reported a stronger sense of belonging to both their local community and the Brazilian nation. This suggests that festivals play a crucial role in reinforcing social bonds and fostering a sense of collective identity. A shared identity is a powerful force for social cohesion. It creates a sense of belonging, fosters mutual respect, and encourages cooperation among diverse groups. By cultivating a shared identity, festivals contribute to building a more inclusive and united society. This study provides compelling evidence that cultural festivals play a pivotal role in fostering social cohesion in multicultural societies like Brazil. By facilitating intergroup contact, enhancing trust, and cultivating a shared identity, festivals contribute to breaking down barriers, reducing prejudice, and promoting a sense of community. These findings have significant implications for policymakers, community organizers, and researchers interested in leveraging the

transformative power of cultural events to build more inclusive and cohesive societies. Festivals are not merely spectacles of entertainment; they are powerful tools for social change. By creating spaces for intercultural dialogue, fostering understanding, and celebrating shared humanity, festivals contribute to the creation of a more just, equitable, and harmonious world.¹⁰⁻¹³

The findings of this study on the role of cultural festivals in fostering social cohesion resonate strongly with a growing body of research that underscores the transformative social impact of cultural events. The observation that participation in cultural festivals leads to positive intergroup attitudes, reduced prejudice, and increased social capital is not an isolated phenomenon but rather a pattern consistently observed across various cultural contexts and geographical locations. Cultural festivals, by their very nature, bring together individuals from diverse backgrounds, creating opportunities for meaningful interactions and shared experiences. Research has consistently shown that such intergroup contact, under optimal conditions, can lead to a reduction in prejudice and an increase in positive attitudes towards members of other groups. The festive atmosphere, characterized by celebration and shared enjoyment, creates a conducive environment for individuals to engage with one another on a human level, transcending stereotypes and preconceived notions. Moreover, festivals often showcase the richness and diversity of different cultures, providing a platform for cultural exchange and appreciation. This exposure to different cultural traditions can challenge ethnocentric biases and foster a sense of curiosity and openness towards others. Studies have demonstrated that individuals who participate in cultural events that expose them to diverse cultures are more likely to develop positive attitudes towards those cultures and their members.¹³⁻¹⁶

Prejudice, often rooted in ignorance and fear of the unknown, can be significantly diminished through positive intergroup contact. Festivals offer a safe and enjoyable space for individuals to interact with people from different backgrounds, challenging stereotypes and promoting understanding. Research has shown

that when people have the opportunity to engage with members of other groups in a positive and cooperative context, they are more likely to see them as individuals rather than representatives of a monolithic group. Furthermore, festivals often celebrate shared values and common human experiences, transcending cultural differences. This emphasis on shared humanity can help to break down barriers and reduce prejudice by highlighting the fundamental similarities that connect us all. Studies have demonstrated that exposure to cultural events that emphasize commonalities across cultures can lead to a reduction in prejudice and discrimination. Social capital, referring to the networks of relationships and trust that facilitate cooperation and collective action, is a crucial component of social cohesion. Cultural festivals, by bringing people together and fostering a sense of shared community, can significantly contribute to the development of social capital. The shared experience of participating in a festival, celebrating cultural traditions, and enjoying artistic performances can create a sense of belonging and connection among attendees. Moreover, festivals often involve collaborative efforts from various community groups, organizations, and individuals. This collaborative process can strengthen existing social networks and foster new connections, leading to increased trust and reciprocity. Research has shown that participation in cultural events that involve collaboration and community engagement can lead to an increase in social capital, contributing to a more cohesive and resilient society.¹⁵⁻¹⁷

The shared experience of celebrating cultural traditions plays a pivotal role in fostering connections and building bridges across cultural divides. Festivals provide a platform for individuals to express their cultural identities, share their traditions, and connect with their heritage. This celebration of diversity creates a sense of common ground, fostering mutual respect and appreciation for different cultures. Moreover, the festive atmosphere often encourages spontaneous interactions and informal conversations, creating opportunities for individuals to connect on a personal level. These informal encounters can lead to the development of friendships and social networks that

transcend cultural boundaries. The shared experience of enjoying music, dance, food, and other cultural expressions can create lasting memories and bonds that contribute to a more cohesive and harmonious society. The findings of this study, which highlight the positive impact of cultural festivals on intergroup attitudes, prejudice reduction, and social capital development, align seamlessly with a wealth of existing research. The shared experience of celebrating cultural traditions at festivals creates a sense of common ground, fostering connections and building bridges across cultural divides. By providing opportunities for meaningful interactions, challenging stereotypes, and promoting cross-cultural understanding, festivals play a crucial role in promoting social cohesion in multicultural societies. This convergence of findings underscores the transformative potential of cultural events in building a more inclusive, tolerant, and connected world. As societies become increasingly diverse, the role of cultural festivals in fostering social cohesion will only become more vital. By supporting and investing in these events, we can create spaces where individuals from all walks of life can come together to celebrate their shared humanity and build a more harmonious future.¹⁸⁻²⁰

4. Conclusion

Cultural festivals serve as vital platforms for celebrating diversity and promoting social cohesion in multicultural societies. By creating spaces for intercultural dialogue, fostering understanding, and building bridges across cultural divides, festivals contribute to the development of more inclusive and cohesive communities. The case of Brazil demonstrates the transformative power of cultural festivals in fostering social cohesion, providing valuable lessons for other multicultural societies around the world.

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
